
State of the HIV Epidemic



People Living with HIV (PLWH) by Zip Code of Residence Miami-Dade County, 2021



Modes of Acquiring HIV Ryan White Program clients' self-reported modes of acquiring HIV in FY 2022.


HIV Transmission Among Male RWP Clients







Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, the RWP maintained clients in care and kept them virally suppressed.



- . In HIV Care Having at least one CD4 or viral load test in a given year.

- Virally Suppressed Having less than 200 copies of HIV per milliliter of blood achieved by consistently taking HIV medicine.

Infectious Disease Elimination Act

HIV transmission via injection drug use was mitigated by the Infectious Disease Elimination Act - IDEA Exchange, an innovative Syringe Services Program (SSP), which started in December 2016 in Miami-Dade County and has become a statewide SSP model.

No Babies Born with HIV

For the fourth year in a row, **no babies were born with HIV** to HIV positive mothers in Miami-Dade County, due in large part to the initiatives funded by the Ryan White Program Part D at University of Miami – Miller School of Medicine, Dept. of Obstetrics, Gynecology & Reproductive Sciences.



Miami-Dade County Successes

HIV Test & Treat / Rapid Access Protocol (TTRA)

The standard of care for every person newly diagnosed with HIV: To receive counselling, evaluation, baseline laboratory tests and start antiretroviral treatment within 7 days of the test.

Our goal: By December 2026, at least 90% of people with HIV living in Miami-Dade County will be aware of their HIV status.



FOCUS: Frontlines of Communities in the United States



Support funding & legislation for expanded HIV testing, including increasing testing in the areas of greatest need, promoting optout HIV testing as part of routine medical care, and promoting HIV testing and sexual health education in schools.

Members complete the annual Assessment of the Recipient Administrative Mechanism survey.

- 1. Motion to accept the changes to the Miami-Dade County Ryan White Program Oral Health Care Standards, as presented.
- 2. Motion to add D5284-Removal unilateral partial denture, and D3221-Pulpal debridement to the Ryan White Oral Health Care formulary.
- 3. Motion to approve the Miami-Dade County Ryan White Program Minimum Primary Medical Care Standards, as presented.
- 4. Motion to approve the Miami-Dade County Ryan White Program Allowable Medical Conditions List, as presented.
- 5. Motion to add to the Ryan White Program Prescription Drug Formulary (RWP Formulary) the medications as indicated in the December 2022 ADAP Formulary Additions Ryan White Prescription Drug Formulary Review Items 1-44, with restriction to tablets only for #18: levonorgestrel, and #22: clonidine; and the exclusion of #2: diclofenac, #3: nepafenac, #10: rifapentine, #20: bempedoic acid, #24: olmesartan, #28: olmesartan/ hydrochlorothiazide, #36: ezetimibe/rosuvastatin, #39: evolocumab, and #40: alirocumab.






People Living with HIV (PLWH) by Zip Code of Residence Miami-Dade County, 2021



Modes of Acquiring HIV Ryan White Program clients' self-reported modes of acquiring HIV in FY 2022.







The Ryan White Program

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, the RWP maintained clients in care and kept them virally suppressed.



- . In HIV Care Having at least one CD4 or viral load test in a given year.
- Retained In Care Having two or more CD4 or viral load tests, at least 3
 months apart.
- Virally Suppressed Having less than 200 copies of HIV per milliliter of blood achieved by consistently taking HIV medicine.

Infectious Disease Elimination Act

HIV transmission via injection drug use was mitigated by the Infectious Disease Elimination Act - IDEA Exchange, an innovative Syringe Services Program (SSP), which started in December 2016 in Miami-Dade County and has become a statewide SSP model.

For the fourth year in a row, **no babies were born with HIV** to HIV positive mothers in Miami-Dade County, due in large part to the initiatives funded by the Ryan White Program Part D at University of Miami – Miller School of Medicine, Dept. of Obstetrics, Gynecology & Reproductive Sciences.



Miami-Dade County Successes

HIV Test & Treat / Rapid Access Protocol (TTRA)

The standard of care for every person newly diagnosed with HIV: To receive counselling, evaluation, baseline laboratory tests and start antiretroviral treatment within 7 days of the test.

Our goal: By December 2026, at least 90% of people with HIV living in Miami-Dade County will be aware of their HIV status.



FOCUS: Frontlines of Communities in the United States



Support funding & legislation for expanded HIV testing, including increasing testing in the areas of greatest need, promoting optout HIV testing as part of routine medical care, and promoting HIV testing and sexual health education in schools.
