II. <u>Introductions</u>

Mpox and HIV

Dr. Alvaro Mejia-Echeverry, Florida Department of Health (FDOH), presented Mpox and HIV via Zoom. The presentation was a broad overview of Mpox, including the virus definition and history; transmission vectors; explanation of the name change from monkeypox to Mpox; rash identification; incubation period; the global and local impacts and demographics; TPOXX treatment and dispensing data; vaccination data; and other factors to be aware of during an outbreak. Members thanked Dr. Mejia-Echeverry for the comprehensive information.

VIII. <u>Reports</u>

Juliana Shapiro reported on recent presentations and member activities and asked Prevention Committee members how Hispanic Initiative could help support their work. She suggested collaborations around National Faith HIV and AIDS Awareness Day, National Latinx AIDS Awareness Day, and WAD; and highlighted member agencies in the workgroup. Members were asked to share ideas for WAD event planning and collaboration.

Transgender Tenacity Power

Luigi Ferrer reported on the impacts of recent Florida legislation regarding transgender health and advised that the FDOH Transgender Services Coordinator has resigned.

Vouth Health Workgroup

Mr. Ferrer advised on upcoming activities and announced Andrew Thomas as the new Senior Health Educator at FDOH in Miami-Dade County.

D The Miami Collaborative MSM Workgroup

Mr. Ferrer advised on discussions around recent LGBTQ+ legislation; highlighted upcoming activities; and announced Alex Moro and Anthony Monsalve as the WG's new Community Co-chairs.

X. <u>New Business</u>

There was no New Business.

XI. Open Discussion and Announcements

Members indicated they would be interested in hearing presentations on trauma-informed care and counseling; and on Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP).

STD Trends Miami-Dade County


- Early syphilis diagnosis rate amongst women aged 15-44 decreased from 2019 to 2020.
- Chlamydia cases among women (15-44) superseded Gonorrhea cases between 2017 and 2021.
- Age at HIV diagnosis amongst all ages and ethnicities continues to fall within individuals aged 25 to 35 years old




Gonorrhea Cases*; Miami-Dade County, Florida 2006-2021



Enhanced ER Screening Tool

- ER screenings were originally programed to screen HCV and HIV. We can now screen for syphilis to circumvent infants born with CS.
- Algorithm was first enhanced by Baptist Homestead Hospital* [2018-2019]
- Automatic opt out tool fully implemented within Jackson Main ER to screen males and females <60 y.o. [2020-present]
- We also partnered with IDEA Exchange



IT'S IMPORTANT TO GET SCREENED

Not all mothers with syphilis have symptoms, so it's important to get tested early and throughout pregnancy. Health care providers are required to test for syphilis during the 1st and 3rd trimesters in Florida.

Syphilis is curable, but left untreated it can be fatal for your baby.

Not everyone with syphilis has symptoms, so it's important to get tested. If you have symptoms, getting checked and treated quickly is important for both you and any sexual partners in order to prevent infection for your baby.


Investigate

Attention is focused on people **experiencing rapid HIV** transmission.

This signifies gaps in HIV prevention and/or treatment services.

This means resources are not efficiently reaching members of our community who are high risk.

Response is crucial to identify and close those gaps to better serve the needs of the community experiencing rapid HIV transmission.





HIV Rapid Transmission Surveillance

Identify gaps in services

Increase testing services and provider awareness of underserved populations



Response Mechanisms

We are addressing those prevention and treatment gaps in services through innovative methods.

- ER Screenings
- Telemedicine

- Improving testing, Prep referrals and navigation, education, partner services, and increasing disease intervention specialists.





Genotypic Testing

HIV-1 genotype resistance tests are critical to ascertain the extent of rapid transmission networks

Allowable under test & treat/rapid access guidance for patient reentry or newly diagnosed

Syndemics and SDOHs

Syndemic is a term for two or more epidemics, that interact biologically and socially to worsen health outcomes.

HIV, Syphilis, COVID 19, Mental Health, Opioid..

Syndemic interactions with SDOH can worsen disease epidemics and further the presence of health disparity.


