I. Call to Order Stephen Herz

Stephen Herz, the Chair, called the meeting to order at 2:09 p.m.

VII. Reports

Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) Program Updates

Robert Tazoe

Roberto Tazoe indicated that the City of Miami has finalized the Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER) report after review by House and Urban Development (HUD) consultants. Last year, the CAPER report was revamped midyear to include additional data points including additional demographic and outcome data not previously required. The program served 813 clients through the tenant-based program, 91 clients through the Short-term Rental, Mortgage, and Utility Assistance (STRMU) program, and 61 clients through the project-based program. A consolidated report will be shared now that the report has been finalized.

HUD also recently conducted an audit of the local HOPWA program. They visited Care Resource and two project-based providers along with the City of Miami. The audit went well, and HUD was happy that there are systems in place for monitoring and collaboration among and between teams and sponsors while protecting client identities.

■ Vacancies Marlen Meizoso

Mrs. Meizoso referenced the membership vacancy report in the meeting materials for March 2024. She indicated that there were various vacancies on the Housing Committee, the Partnership, and the other Committees. Anyone who knows of interested individuals can invite them to a meeting or training, or direct them to staff. One member of the affected community has been recommended for the Partnership with a possible additional three more applicants within the next month.

Meeting materials included the March 2024 Partnership Report with approved motions for Community Coalition, Care and Treatment, and Strategic Planning committees.

VIII. Standing Business

Stakeholder Invitation Development

All

The Committee has been discussing reaching out to stakeholders to invite them to a meeting to discuss collaborations. Based on discussions at the last meeting, a plan was developed and staff drafted a letter of invitation. Members reviewed the letter and discussed next steps. Mr. Tazoe indicated he would not be available until July, therefore members decided the stakeholder meeting would take place in July. A motion was made to approve the invitation to the stakeholders with a July meeting date and the letter will be brought to the Partnership meeting in May for ratification.

Motion to approve the stakeholder invitation letter, as updated. Moved: Lileaus Hill Seconded: Roberto Tazoe

The Committee then reviewed the placeholder agenda for the July meeting. The following suggestions were made:

- Move standing business items to new business on the agenda;
- Add times on the agenda for items to help guests identify when they will be presenting;
- Abbreviate housekeeping presentation;
- After the introduction of stakeholders by the Chair, present a short epidemiological (epi) presentation (2 slides and map, possibly);
- After the epi slides, introduce the City of Miami HOPWA program and what additional assistance is offered beyond services for people with HIV;
- Open the floor for presentation by stakeholders to address:
 - 1. What housing do you currently offer?
 - 2. Do you currently have any housing assistance for low-income individuals and if so when would it open?
 - **3.** Can you offer/ reserve any resources for the HIV population?
- After stakeholder presentations, open the floor for questions and answers session.

The Committee discussed the meeting room layout. Instead of having invitees sit in the audience, the Committee will invite speakers to sit at the table to promote dialogue. Guests can sit around a larger desk in the center of the room. Since the TV is in the center of the room and blocked by columns, no AV will be used. All materials will be printed and handed out at the meeting.

Based on the agenda items, staff proposed not meeting in April to allow time to gather data for review at the May meeting. At the May meeting, the stakeholder meeting agenda and all the items that will be presented can be fine-tuned. The Committee agreed to the timeline.

Mrs. Meizoso indicated the Source of Income forms were distributed at the last meeting. Those members who have not completed one yet will be sent a copy via email to complete. Forms are due to the County by the end of June.

Mr. Tazoe indicated that the City of Miami is working on its Consolidated Plan so public hearing meetings will be held specific to the HOPWA program within the next two months. Information will be forwarded to Behavioral Science Research to share widely.



Technical Notes

- Report Data for 2020 and 2021 should be interpreted with caution due to the impact of a public health emergency on HIV testing, care-related services, and case surveillance activities in state and local jurisdictions.
- Unless otherwise noted, all data in this presentation are as of 6/30/2023.

- Reach year, the HIV data for the previous calendar year and all prior years back to 1979 are finalized and frozen for reporting purposes on June 30. The frozen data are used in all data reports until the following June 30, when the continuously deduplicated HIV/AIDS data set will be finalized and frozen again.
- Unless otherwise noted, population-related data (such as rates) are provided by FLHealthCHARTS as of 6/30/2023.



- HIV-Related deaths represent persons with an HIV diagnosis in the CDC's enhanced HIV/AIDS Reporting System (eHARS) who resided in Florida at death and whose underlying cause of death was HIV, regardless of whether their HIV status was reported in Florida.
- STI data are derived from the Surveillance Tools and Reporting System (STARS) and provided by the STD Prevention and Control Section as of 7/01/2023.



- X HIV diagnoses by year represent persons whose HIV was diagnosed in that year, regardless of AIDS status at time of diagnosis.
- AIDS and HIV diagnoses by year are not mutually exclusive and cannot be added together.



- X HIV prevalence data represent PWH living in Florida through the end of the calendar year, regardless of where they were diagnosed.
- X For diagnosis data over time, sub-geographical area data exclude Florida Department of Corrections (FDC) and Federal Correctional Institution (FCI) diagnoses. For prevalence data, area and county data include FDC and FCI data.

- Adult diagnoses represent people ages 13 years and older; pediatric diagnoses represent people under the age of 13 years.
 - For data by year of diagnosis, age is by age at diagnosis.
 - For prevalence data, age is by current age at the end of the most recent calendar year, regardless of age at diagnosis.

 Unless noted, White and Black people are non- Hispanic/Latino, and Other (which may be omitted in some graphs due to small numbers) represents American Indian/Alaska Native, Asian/Pacific Islander, or multi-racial.



Definitions of Mode of Exposure Categories

- Heterosexual: Sexual contact between a male and female
 who received an HIV diagnosis or had a known HIV risk.
- Other Sexual Contact: Other sexual contact resulting in a person acquiring HIV.
- Other Risk: Includes recipients of clotting factor for hemophilia or other coagulation disorders, recipients of HIV-infected blood or blood components other than clotting factor or of HIVinfected tissue, perinatal and other pediatric risks, or other confirmed risks.

Implement routine HIV and STI screening in health care settings and priority testing in non-health care settings.


Provide rapid access to treatment and ensure retention in care (Test and Treat).

Improve and promote access to antiretroviral PrEP and nPEP.




Demographics of People Diagnosed with HIV

Diagnoses of HIV, 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County






Diagnoses of AIDS, 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult HIV Diagnosis Rates by Sex, 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County




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


Adult HIV and AIDS Diagnoses By Sex, 2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult HIV Diagnosis Rates By Race or Ethnicity, 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult Male HIV Diagnosis Rates By Race or Ethnicity, 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult Female HIV Diagnosis Rates By Race or Ethnicity, 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult HIV Diagnoses by Age At Diagnosis, 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult HIV Diagnoses by ZIP Code of Residence At Diagnosis, 2020–2022, Miami-Dade County








Adult HIV and AIDS Diagnoses and Population by Race or Ethnicity, 2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult HIV Diagnosis Rates by Sex And Race or Ethnicity, 2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult HIV Diagnoses By Sex and Age at Diagnosis, 2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult Male HIV Diagnoses by Mode of Exposure, 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult Female HIV Diagnoses by Mode of Exposure, 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County






Adult PWH by ZIP Code of Residence,¹ 2022 Living in Miami-Dade County








MSM¹ with HIV by ZIP Code of Residence,² 2022 Living in Miami-Dade County







PWID¹ with HIV by ZIP Code of Residence,² 2022 Living in Miami-Dade County








Persons with Heterosexual Contact with HIV by ZIP Code of Residence, 2022, Living in Miami-Dade County




HIV Care Continuum Definitions

- **PWH:** Persons with HIV living in Florida at the end of 2022.
- X In Care: PWH with at least one documented VL or CD4 lab, medical visit, or prescription from 1/1/2022 through 3/31/2023.
- Retained in Care: PWH with two or more documented VL or CD4 labs, medical visits or prescriptions at least three months apart from 1/1/2022 through 6/30/2023.

HIV Care Continuum Definitions, continued

- Suppressed Viral Load: PWH with a suppressed VL (<200 copies/mL) on their last VL lab from 1/1/2022 through 3/31/2023.</p>
- Not in Care: PWH with no documented VL or CD4 lab, medical visit or prescription from 1/1/2022 through 3/31/2023.
- Linked to Care: PWH with at least one documented VL or CD4 lab, medical visit, or prescription following their first HIV diagnosis date.

Persons Who Received an HIV Diagnosis Along the HIV Care Continuum in 2022, Miami-Dade County








PWH Along the HIV Care Continuum in 2022, Living in Miami-Dade County






PWH Along the HIV Care Continuum, 2020–2022, Living in Miami-Dade County








Percentage of PWH Who Had a Suppressed VL by ZIP Code of Residence, 2022, Living in Miami-Dade County








Percentage of PWH Who Were Not in Care by ZIP Code of Residence¹ in 2022, Living in Miami-Dade County











HIV-Related Deaths in Miami-Dade County

Rate of HIV-Related Deaths 2013–2022, Miami-Dade County








HIV Prevention for Miami-Dade County

Priority Populations for Primary HIV Prevention in 2022, Miami-Dade County






Priority Populations for Prevention for PWH

HIV Testing

Everyone between the ages of 13 and 64 should get tested for HIV at least once. Persons at <u>increased risk</u> for HIV should get tested at least annually. Visit <u>knowyourhivstatus.com</u> for testing options in your area or to order a free at-home testing kit.

Florida law (section 384.31, Florida Statutes) requires all pregnant women to be tested for HIV and other STIs at their initial prenatal care visit, again at 28–32 weeks and at labor and delivery if their HIV status is unknown.

PrEP

PrEP medication, taken as directed, can reduce the risk of acquiring HIV through sexual contact by over 90% and through injection drug use by 70%. Condoms are still important during sex to prevent other STIs and unwanted pregnancy. STIs are increasing in Florida and can increase HIV risk. To find a PrEP provider who can help you decide if PrEP is right for you, visit <u>preplocator.org</u>.

Antiretroviral Therapy (ART)

For PWH, starting ART as soon as possible improves health outcomes and quality of life by reducing viral load and the risk of disease progression. People living with HIV who take antiretroviral medication as prescribed and achieve and maintain an undetectable viral load cannot transmit HIV to their sexual partners. ART is recommended for all PWH, regardless of how long they have had HIV or how well they feel. To find a care provider or to learn more about the resources available to PWH, visit floridaaids.org.
